

2010 Services Provided



Education:

Provided free, weekly parenting education meetings to 298 individuals with 5 groups: English families, Spanish families, fathers (and/or male role models), parents of teens, and incarcerated parents.

Adult Basic Education provided 14 ABE parents with 22 children funding for child care and there are 6 women in the Pre-GED or the Advanced ELL program

Total adult contact of 6237 for 100 participants served and 14 participants.

78.6% of parents increased a learning level

20 families were served and 29 children within those families were on the Sliding Fee Scale

264 general crime victims, 25 sexual assault victims and 224 domestic violence victims were served and 9 crime victims were safe-housed

563 members of the community heard 42 presentations focused on crime prevention and education on resources for victims

43 male offenders of intimate partner violence learned to identify alternatives to power and control; identify all forms of physical, mental and emotional abuse used; and agree not to use any violence or threats of violence

806 callers were provided with parenting education and support via Parent Warmline/Linea de Apoyo

20 parents provided with repeated in-home parent education/support

127 incarcerated parents provided with repeated parent education/support at Albert Lea Detention Center

481 youth and adults were provided with leadership experiences

Income:

6,299 Meals on Wheels delivered to 73 homebound seniors in rural Freeborn County

41 individuals received shelter and services

30,667 meals served to 519 seniors in group dining settings

21 children enrolled in child care service



Health

262 individuals with low or moderate means received quality counseling services

1,188 hours of emergency childcare services provided

3 CARE Homes/11 providers in Freeborn County that are recruited/trained/supported

71% of people applying for financial assistance signed up for another 6 months at The Y

26 victims of fires were provided with food, shelter, clothing, quilts and comfort kits

42 volunteers were trained for disaster response/62 clean up kits and 30 comfort kits were given out

600 people were trained in CPR/First Aid/AED and Babysitting

3,045 men/women and children in the community were provided with basic emergency services by The Salvation Army

14 households were assisted with energy bills



5,307 (unduplicated) people served through food pantry

642 residents received tuition assistance for a Family Y membership

42 (unduplicated) and 3,344 duplicated (door count) individuals benefited from after school programming, summer programming, and athletic activities such as Track & Field, bowling and Special Olympics events

Provided ride services to 398 clients age 60 and over

Nearly 30 volunteers donated 8,259 hours of ride services, covering 111,411 miles

1,349 hours of lawn care and snow removal services provided to 39 seniors

475 volunteer respite hours provided to caregivers of senior family members
